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

The Column: Eddie Myer

Indelible Blue



As we've noted before in this column, there's not a great deal of jazz being broadcast on mainstream radio. BBC 6 Music is an excellent station featuring a range of diverse programming, but many jazz fans may feel it doesn't really cater to their taste and therefore might unfortunately have missed Gilles Peterson's two hour tribute to Blue Note Records that went out this Saturday - if so, you can find it on the iPlayer here- http:// www.bbc.co.uk/programmes/bo4tlmxq. This was the second time he's devoted his entire show to Blue Note - in the trailer, he says "Blue Note means the world to me - it's the backbone of my record collection". The label celebrates it's 75th anniversary this year, an event marked in the recent London Jazz Festival by a flagship concert featuring Robert Glasper and Ambrose Akinmusire leading a stellar line-up. Back in 1939, Blue Note was but one of a slew of labels emerging from the days of scratchy 78rpm shellac and the wartime recording ban into the excitingly hip future of hi-fi LP records, bebop and post-war affluence. But whereas Savoy, Dial, Prestige, Bethlehem and Riverside are today unknown to all but cognoscenti, Blue Note Records retains cult brand status and its own section in the specialist record stores. There's a good chance that when your average modern listener refers to 'jazz' as a general term, what they have in mind is something sounding like the classic 50s Blue Note releases - a sound so recognisable that it's become archetypal. What's the story behind its enduring appeal?

To begin with, the story of the label is itself resonant as an American archetype - a tale of immigrants who arrived in the USA fleeing persecution in their homelands, encountering an all-American artform and parlaying its vitality into lasting commercial success. Alfred Lion, Francis Woolf and Max Margulis started by releasing records of traditional New Orleans bands and boogie-woogie pianists, but their move into bebop modernism and beyond placed them into the rapidly expanding market for aspirational hipness that saw the more cutting edge of the middle classes embracing jazz LPs as markers of their sophistication and progressive thinking. It's worth reading Lion's mission statement on setting up the label; in it, he declares:

"Blue Note Records are designed simply to serve the uncompromising expressions of hot jazz or swing, in general. Any particular style of playing which represents an authentic way of musical feeling is genuine expression. By virtue of its significance in place, time and circumstance, it possesses its own tradition, artistic standards and audience that keeps it alive. Hot jazz, therefore, is expression and communication, a musical and social manifestation, and Blue Note records are concerned with identifying its impulse, not its sensational and commercial adornments."

Blue Note kept close to this philosophy; their 'hard-bop' vision of jazz was modern and forward-looking, but stayed true enough to the values of hot swing for their releases to be accessible to a wider audience, rewarding them with massive national hit singles such as Lee Morgan's *Sidewinder* - a situation sadly almost unthinkable for a jazz label today. Hard-bop acts like Art Blakey's Jazz Messengers and Horace Silver's bands (memorably re-imagined by local piano legend Roy Hilton in a series of popular gigs across the South in recent years) were hugely popular while also setting a benchmark for jazz authenticity such that their legacy seems now beyond dispute.

It's easy to overlook that things were not straight-forward. always any ethnomusicologist will tell you, authenticity is a quality often demanded but difficult to define. The great critic and cultural commentator Amiri Baraka published his seminal critical appraisement of jazz, Blues People, in 1963 - in it, he is utterly, scathingly dismissive of the soulful, funky Blue Note sound as an elaborate form of Uncle-Tomming, declaring "there is nothing more hideous than the spectacle of an urban, college-trained Negro pretending that he has the same field of emotional reference as his great-grandfather, the Mississippi slave". He disparages Silver by name, remarking acidly that "merely calling tunes "Dis Heah" or dropping 'g's from titles is not going to make the music more compelling" . By the late 60s, many critics and audiences had come to agree, regarding Blue Note as purveyors of a music that was stale, formulaic and dated, and label stalwarts such as Hank Mobley and 'Philly' Joe Jones suddenly found themselves

scuffling for gigs. Come the 70s, with Lion retired and Wolff dead, the label moved into commercial Jazz-Funk before being purchased by EMI in 1979 and promptly 'put to sleep'. What critical acclaim it retained was due to it's relatively brief 60s embrace of the avant-garde sounds of Eric Dolphy, Ornette Coleman and Andrew Hill, and the superb series of albums by Wayne Shorter; such stalwarts as Grant Green, Ike Quebec or Sonny Clark were simply forgotten.

What turned things around? It's an interesting study of the enduring appeal of the core elements of jazz's identity. The 1980s saw a global revival of interest in jazz as a music that was simultaneously 'an authentic way of musical feeling' and expressive of a more sophisticated, progressive viewpoint. Reissuers, DJs, critics and listeners excavating jazz history found that artefacts from the Blue Note vaults suddenly looked like classics again. Lion and Woolf had always striven more than most to create high-quality product - even after twenty or thirty years, the records unfailingly look and sound great. As a whole generation of hip-hop artists were to discover, the musical values of the hard-bop generation were actually very compatible with later generations raised on soul and funk - as soulful, rhythmic and neatly executed, just with more chord changes - and this led to many fruitful collaborations. Japan embraced the label wholeheartedly - In the UK, the Tommy Chase band was modelled closely on the Blue Note template and gave Alan Barnes some of his earliest exposure. Driven by the CD boom, the label flourished - old albums were reissued, unreleased sessions saw the light of day, and finally new artists were signed. Following the demise of EMI, the label was acquired by Universal, and mega-producer Don Was, most noted for his work with the Rolling Stones, took over as president (he's also a bass player and his favourite Blue Note is Speak No Evil by Wayne Shorter). Blue Note had come to encapsulate a cross-genre set of standards for quality and authenticity. With a current roster including Norah Jones, Wynton Marsalis and Gregory Porter on the one hand, and Jaimeo Brown, Derrick Hodge and Kendrick Scott on the other, they're at once commercially successful and critically respected. It's the gold standard for a label survival model. Alfred Lion would surely be proud and the meticulously remastered Rudy Van Gelder reissue programme provides a long list of potential Christmas gifts for any of you starting on your seasonal shopping extravaganza. •





NIKKI ILES

You've worked a lot with saxophonist Karen Sharp. What do you like most about working with her?

I've worked with Karen for about 8 years through working with Tina May in those early days. She is a great player who started her musical life at the Royal Northern College of Music as a composer and found her own way into the music . It's really refreshing working with someone who isn't affected or influenced by any trends and plays in a very honest and direct way. She is also a great band leader who finds material that gives everyone the space to express themselves and importantly has a lot of fun, which helps the music of course!

You've worked with a lot of well-known musicians. Who would you most like to work with in the future?

Firstly...I am looking forward to the May tour with my group with Norma Winstone and excited about the new CD out in April . I would love to get a few more playings of my big band music and perhaps even a recording!

At this year's London Jazz Festival you performed your compositions with the Royal Academy of Music Big Band. What was that like?

This was a really great experience ... It was amazing to hear your music fully orchestrated and played so beautifully (in 3D!). I have grown up loving big bands from Sinatra and Basie, Ellington, Thad Jones, Mel Lewis through to Kenny Wheeler and Mike Gibbs, so to have a project of all my music at the Queen Elizabeth Hall was an honour.

I know that you're a big fan of Kenny Wheeler's compositions and you worked with him a few times. What memories do you have of working with him?

Probably the most memorable and moving was on a trip to Canada with Norma Winstone and two Canadians I was working with at the time (Duncan Hopkins and Anthony Michelli). We did a couple of things in Toronto and then headed to St. Catherine's where Ken grew up ... It was a great gig at a packed concert hall and after every tune there

was a standing ovation for Ken. It really brought it home to me how his music touched so many people throughout the world.

Tell us a bit about all the education work that you do.

I regularly teach at The Royal Academy of Music, Middlesex University and in my local town, at Bedford School. I also teach on many short courses for both adults, young people and teachers. Much of the work is to equip people with a practical and aural understanding of the building blocks of the music and help to open some doors regarding listening and encouraging curiosity, imagination and self expression.

Your last album, *Hush*, was recorded back in 2010. Do you have any plans for your next album?

Yes. I am finally releasing Westerly on Basho Records in April 2015. It's my group, The Printmakers, with Norma Winstone (!!), Mark Lockheart on sax, Mike Walker on guitar, Steve Watts on bass and James Maddren on drums. I love this group...and to finally write and record with Norma is a dream come true!



KAREN SHARP

You worked in Humphrey Lyttelton's band. What memories do you have of working with Humph?

I was with Humph for almost four years and I had a ball! It was early in my playing days and I learnt so much from him, I was very lucky. My overriding memories of Humph would have to be his sense of fun and his absolute commitment to music and his audiences. He was busy touring the country until the very end of his life, playing to packed houses, driving himself to gigs and signing CDs or chatting in the foyer until the very last people had gone home. I don't know where he got his energy from!



You've also done quite a lot of touring. What have been your favourite places?

I have been lucky enough have played in some of the worlds most spectacular cities, and I have toured extensively in the UK. For me the best gigs are the more intimate affairs where little amplification is needed and the connection between us and the audience is at its most powerful. Impressive backdrops such as table mountain in Cape Town or the heart of downtown Singapore are very exciting too of course!

You've worked a lot with pianist Nikki Iles. What do you like most about working with her?

I have worked with Nikki on and off for around ten years now, we got to know each other on an exciting trip to Tokyo with Tina May in 2006 and have since played together as a duo and of course in the last four years we have been working alongside Dave Green and Steve Brown in my quartet. Nikki is a wonderfully sensitive, yet powerful, musician who can swing like nobody's business as well as paint the most beautiful colours, harmonically and rhythmically - a real inspiration.

You're appearing at Chichester Jazz Club on Friday 12th December. Tell us what we can expect at the gig.

We are all looking forward to coming back to Chichester in December. The band have been together now for around four years and I think we would all agree that we have grown together and the band has developed a really distinctive, cohesive sound - the sort that only comes from musicians that have worked together many times. We are all great friends too so we will be having a lot of fun playing all sorts of tunes from the latest album, *Spirit*, as well as some recent discoveries - the emphasis is very much on true improvisation on fantastic tunes, simple really.



What future plans do you have? Albums, tours?

A new album next year is very likely, and we will be touring in the summer.

Terry Seabrook's

Jazz Tip of the Month No. 17 Musical Circles

The circle (or cycle) of 5ths (or 4ths) is a well known tool in music theory for understanding the relationships between keys by means of a clock-like arrangement to illustrate the order and number of sharps and flats in signatures. It was invented by Johann Heinichen in the early 18th century (and reached the parts other music theorists had failed to reach).

But the circle can be used to illustrate many other musical relations. Here is a list as illustrated in the diagrams below:

- (a) Tritone pairs (diametric opposites)
- (b) Diminished seventh chords (any four corners)
- (c) The order of **flat key** signatures clockwise from


F (for major) or from D (for minor)

- (d) The order of **sharp key signatures** <u>anti-clockwise</u>
 from G (for major) or from
 E (for minor)
- (e) The order of **flat notes** <u>in</u> key signatures <u>clockwise</u> from B (as Bb) (for major & minor keys)
- (f) The order of **sharp notes**<u>in</u> key signatures anti-<u>clockwise</u> from F (as F#)
 (for major & minor keys)
- (g) Seven-note segments give the notes in a major scale (and therefore all 7 modes

- including the relative minor aka the aeolian mode)
- (h) Alternate notes show whole tone scales
- (i) Clockwise 4-note segments show stacked notes in quartal chords (2 or 3 stacked 4ths)
- (j) 3 points of an equilateral triangle (not illustrated here) produces augmented triads

Another use of the circle is as a system for practising an item in all keys (often cited as an essential task when practising in jazz) whether it

be a lick, a scale, a voicing, a progression, a song or a transcription – just follow the circle of 5ths.





However there are other musical circles which can be used for theory and for practise.

The most obvious is the chromatic scale which can be arranged as a circle (see 2 below). Similarly any 12-tone row can be arranged in a circle to produce a **random** circle (see 3 below). A nearinfinite number of these are possible). (How many exactly, you mathematicians out there?) You should use this for practice a lot because there is no internal interval order to it so the thing you are practising has to be very well mastered. The whole tone scale (of which there are only two) can be

arranged into 2 consecutive circles (see 4 below). This is a good way to practise II V I progressions etc. The three diminished seventh chords can be displayed as 3 consecutive circles (see 5 below) and the four augmented triads can be displayed as 4 consecutive circles (see 6 below)

All these can be used for practising something in all keys. Use a different one each time, or start at a different point and go in either direction (clock or anti-clockwise).

Tommaso Starace

The Verdict, Brighton Friday 28th November 2014

Saxophonist Tommaso Starace presented a concert of original compositions influenced by the images of Italian photographer Gianni Berengo Gardin from his latest album *Italian Short Stories*.

Showing the images on a screen, Tommaso explained each photograph and how he had derived a story, an emotion and melodic material, essentially what inspired him most about the image.

Featuring a number of Gardin's iconic images of Venice, Starace also included some images of Milan and Palermo, as well as his hometown of Napoli.

The piece *Olivetti's Touch* had a powerful resonance and many of the compositions made the pictures come alive. This process was helped by the delicate and sensitive piano playing of John Turville on piano and the responsive drumming of Tommy Bradascio.

The only non-original piece, also from the album, was an adaptation of Maurice Ravel's *Adagio Assai* which didn't seem out of place amongst the other cinematic pieces.

Many of the tunes performed weren't simply vehicles for improvisation. As Starace has said about the album "Improvisation is still present but in a less important role: it is the melodies that accompany and bring to life the images that tell a tale."

If you have the chance to see the band perform live, take it and also check out the album *Italian Short Stories*, available on the Universal/Emarcy label.

The Verdict, Brighton Friday 5th December

This was Preston/Glasgow/Lowe's return to the Verdict having performed there in October 2013 with flautist Gareth Lockrane (you can read the review of that gig <u>here</u>).

The band have an amazing sound, with or without flute, helped by the sheer virtuosity, energy and musicianship of the performers.

Preston's intricate melodic lines intertwined with the basslines of Kevin Glasgow, who also dazzled with guitar-like solos.

Each musician displayed an impressive knowledge of extended techniques, which helped to drive the music forward. Drummer Lowe impressed everyone with his speed and accuracy, with propulsive polyrhythms and accented cymbal lines.

Preston's composition *Power Ballad* went down well with the audience, together with his tune *CPU*.

The Glasgow originals Sigur, Scruff & Shadow and The Priory sounded even better than I remembered from last year and will surely feature on their upcoming album (due in March next year).

What was most impressive about this band was that not only was all the material original but it was also played entirely from memory.
