# Christmas Wish List



the wish-list is a decent local radio representation.

Looking over the first issue from way back in September 2013 gives a convenient assessment of how the scene has developed or faltered since then. We're sad to note that Chichester College is no longer running it's Jazz course at Level 2 or Level 3. While it still provides the only HND in Jazz in the South outside London, the access levels have provided a constant stream of young players for the last 25 years, and a significant number of musicians on the scene today got their start at Chichester. We lament the passing of both the Green Door Store Jazz sessions, and the Blue Note jazz club. On a national level, Jazz Services has lost it's National Portfolio status and we await to see how it will re-group and continue to support jazz in the UK. It's worth noting that the amount of money from central government to support jazz has actually slightly increased, but still remains at about fifty times less than the amount granted to classical and opera!

On the plus side, the local gig scene continues to thrive in defiance of continuing gloomy prognostications about the economy. Special mention must go to the Snowdrop's Monday night sessions, the Bristol Bar's popular Thursdays, the venerable Sunday night gigs at the Lion and Lobster and the Hand in Hand, and the new Wednesday nights at the Park View and weekends at the Rialto. It's even more gratifying to see that players and audiences can sustain no less than three regular weekly jam sessions, at

Those of you lucky enough to find the time to read this column amidst the relentless hurly burly of seasonal cheer may find yourselves in reflective mood as the year draws to an end and we all have a chance to review how things actually panned out. The very fact that some of you are now reading this sentence represents a victory of some sort, as The Sussex Jazz Magazine is now in it's 35th issue, which in itself is a tribute to the tireless hard work and dedication of it's editorial team. A dedicated publication is an invaluable asset to the grassroots scene, as jazz remains under-represented in the media at both the local and national level. There's three sides to the jazz triangle - the players, the audience, and the burgeoning educational sector, and it can be hard for them all to keep track of each other's activities. In any grassroots scene, information is key to survival, and Sussex Jazz Mag is the only comprehensive guide to gigs, workshops, venues, the latest projects by local players, and insights into the preoccupations of visiting stars from Neil Cowley to Dave Holland. Like Lebowski's rug, it really ties the scene together. The challenges ahead for 2015 will be sustaining its quality, expanding its content, and increasing its reach to include more people who would love to get involved in jazz but just don't know it yet. There's scope to include some reader feedback, if our esteemed editor is prepared to take on the challenge of the savage free-for-all that is a Reader's Letters page. As we discussed in this column not long ago, the next item on

the Bee's Mouth on Monday, the Brunswick on Tuesday and the Verdict on Wednesday - surely a unique situation across the country. Add in regulars at the Seven Stars and the Black Lion and you get a picture of a very busy scene. It's heartening to see that the Verdict is surviving despite the endless roadworks outside, and it's growing national reputation as simply the best sounding room in the business was boosted by internationally respected pianist Frank Harrison's decision to release the live recording of his last gig there - what was intended as a reference recording came out sounding too good to keep from the public. Meanwhile the Brighton Jazz Club and Small's at the Caxton Arms continue to bring us outstanding seasons of national and international artists.

Good news continues on the festival front as well, with tickets already on sale for the third megafest that is Love Supreme in July 2015 and the first South Coast Jazz Festival debuting at the Ropetackle in Shoreham in January. In

fact for anyone wanting to see live jazz in the Brighton area the main problem is one of too much choice! It's a good state of affairs, but let's not be complacent. The number one item on everyone's Christmas wishlist should be the continuing support of venue owners, musicians, promoters, but most of all audiences. In true Dickensian Christmas style, let's all give ourselves a big pat on the back for the way we've enabled such a busy scene to thrive, then follow it with a stern Victorian finger-wagging warning. It's our scene to treasure or to lose the best gift you can give for 2015 would be a series of full houses, and all you need to do to make it happen is keep turning up!



# Jazz Clubs

2014 saw the return of Brighton Jazz Club with its focus on putting on world-class jazz artists at larger venues, with a programme that included Food (Thomas Strønen & Iain Ballamy), Tim Garland and John Surman.

2014 also saw many other jazz clubs and promoters putting on strong programmes of top quality musicians, such as The Verdict, Smalls, JazzHastings, Chichester Jazz Club, Steyning Jazz Club and The Brunswick, all of which continue to support the wealth of local talent in Sussex.

Special mention should also be given to the series of fantastic lunchtime recitals put on by Peter Morris at All Saints Church in Hove.

# **Jazz Education**

April 2014 saw the first Jazz Educators Conference held in Brighton, hosted by Wayne McConnell (tutor at University of Chichester and Brighton Jazz School)

The same month also saw the beginning of the Steyning Jazz Workshop.

Saxshop, under the direction of Mark Bassey and Beccy Perez Rork hosted the 100 Saxophones Rides Again event and Claire Martin presented a vocal masterclass at The Verdict in association with Brighton Jazz School.

### **Local Bands**

2014 saw some amazing local talent join together to perform across the county the greatest of which must be Mark Edwards' Cloggz.

The Love Supreme Festival showcased some great local bands such as Mingus Underground and the Al Scott Quintet, together with two of the most magical big bands in Sussex - Straight No Chaser and the Studio 9 Orchestra.

### **Nordic Noir**

2014 saw performances by Finnish band Tonight at Noon who performed the music of Mingus with Tony Kofi at The Brunswick in Hove back in May.

Also in May, pianist Kit Downes performed at The Verdict in Brighton with Norwegian band Motif.

And Brighton Jazz Club presented Food at the Komedia, featuring Norwegian percussionist Thomas Strønen.

And not forgetting Sussex residents Kjell Berglund from Sweden and Sara Oschlag from Denmark.

# THE IMPROV COLUMN

In the final issue of 2014, pianist **Wayne McConnell** ends with...endings.

# Stop the Train - Endings

In my last column, we talked about introductions so it is only right we look at ways to end tunes. I'm really talking about jam session settings where there is little or no time to organise endings without charts. Endings must provide a tune with a musical conclusion. They must appropriately bring the tune to a close to allow the listener to move on. You can of course use the element of surprise in endings, by making it seem that the song is going to finish but then go somewhere else

If you are intending on playing at a jam session (and you should!) you are expected to know how to end a tune. Endings rarely get talked about, they just sort of happen. In order for this to happen smoothly and without problems, you are expected to know a few of the more common endings.

# III-VI-II-V Ending (3 Times Ending/Tag ending)

This is perhaps the most used ending of all time. It works well on either major or minor tunes that end on the I. You replace the last chord of the song (the tonic) with the minor III chord e.g.Gm7....C7....Fmaj7 will become: Gm7....C7....[.Am7..D7..Gm7..C7] X 3 the final 4 chords in the box brackets are repeated 3 times followed by ending on the tonic, in this case Fmaj7 (or fmaj7#11, or F7b9#11).

# **Ellington Ending**

This ending comes from the Ellington classic 'Take the A Train':



There are lots of variations to this:, the final chord can be a C7#9,or a Cmaj7#11. It works when tune ends in the tonic key and works best on slow to up swing numbers.

# The Basie Ending

Count Basie played this ending a lot on many of his Big Band recordings:



Again, there are variations, just listen to some of those great Bigband albums and steal them!

# Vamp Ending

Vamps are a great way to end a tune, usually you would talk about this before but its usually not more than 'vamp on.....for the ending'. If the tune is in a minor key, say Cminor, you might hear someone say, vamp in and out on Cminor. That means you vamp on C minor as an intro

AND as an ending. These endings are fun because they are open-ended and anyone can improvise or take control of what might happen. Very in-keeping with the genre.

# **Chromatic Chords Ending**

I'm not really sure what you'd call this ending but I've heard it (and played it a lot). In this one, you play a series of chromatic minor 7th chords leaving down to the #2 chord before ending on the I.




This one will work on any tune that ends on the tonic chord. You would normally talk about this ending before-hand

These endings are best used in jam session settings where there is very little time to

arrange an ending. However, since we have the time, by all means try these out but see if you can come up with your own 'arranged' introductions and endings for your songs. Think outside the box, try different things out, be creative! Above all, listen to the grand masters and check out what they do. Some tunes are difficult to end: I find Au Privave, How High the Moon and Sweet Georgia Brown difficult to end because the melodies are rhythmically abrupt right up to the end of the tunes. Maybe they warrant endings being written. Check out the players who play these tunes a lot and see what they do. Listening to the trio recordings of Oscar Peterson will give you some great examples of more intricate endings that are more arranged. Listening to the great big bands will also give you some ideas. Remember to always be as musical as possible!

# Reviews



The **Frank Harrison Trio** performed at The Verdict, Brighton on Friday 12th December, reviewed here by Jasmine Sharif.

### **Frank Harrison Trio**

The Verdict, Brighton Friday 12th December 2014

It's not often that the Verdict turns into Hogwarts. But it's here, on a fittingly still and atmospheric midwinter night, that the 60-strong audience is treated to live selections from *Lunaris*, an album that cost around £7,000 to record and master. From this, Frank Harrison had the idea of recording his trio's performance there earlier this year, as a personal memento. Out of this, as he tells his listeners, simply and organically grew another album, *Live at the Verdict*, which cost him nothing. So he thought he'd let his fans download it from his website for free.

Harrison's gentle manner is interlaced with perceptive wry wit and humour as he draws the audience into his intimate world. From the beginning of the first set, the band seems to present

a series of musical magic lantern slides, gently shifting from subtly played but Bill swinging Evans standards, to Harrison's original compositions inspired by the river, sky and fields near Jericho in Oxford, full of melody and emotion, and featuring some eloquent and sometimes dark dialogue between piano, bass and drums, as if it were written by Philip Pullman. There's a dreamlike, surreal quality to this set, led by Sunrise (Port

Meadow), which is performed with charismatic spontaneity and has a real sense of place.

On the more upbeat *Dindi* by Antonio Carlos Jobim, Enzo Zirilli comes into his own. His drum solos are given plenty of space, alternating between making conversation, acting as stage sound effects and using intelligent and atmospheric dynamics, all in a theatre of rhythm. By contrast, the soulful and moving *Lament*, takes the listener on an emotional journey, from wonderment, to happiness, to sadness and back again, and drawing murmurs of 'beautiful', from the people sitting either side of me.

"We're here to make money, it's all about getting your cash," quips Harrison. But what we're hearing belies his words, as his work is amongst some of the most spiritually inspired in jazz, which I've ever heard. Harrison and trio also endear themselves to the audience with a rambling, sometimes whimsical informality and tendency to play whatever they want to in the moment, often forgetting to promote the albums.

Equally, on Harrison's Flowing at Rest and on Fats Waller's Jitterbug Waltz, I notice Dave Whitford's insistent walking bass line, central to both pieces, and dynamic bluesy call-and-responses between piano and drums. Jitterbug in particular, is re-interpreted in many different moods, tempo changes, light and shade, colours and textures, in a glittering experimental collaboration by all three players. You certainly won't have heard a version like this before.

For the second set, Harrison changes the mood completely with a deeply felt version of classic pop ballad *Answer Me*, lulling the audience into a hush before they remember to applaud. Then Zirilli swings into *You Are Too Beautiful*, urging both Dave Whitford and Harrison into that intimate musical dialogue with him again, which for me alternately evokes a series of abstract colour

paintings, and hypnotic film soundtracks. It's all highly visual, sensual stuff.

"This is the best room in the country for playing in," declares an exultant Harrison, before easing into the meditative, reflective *Tea for Two*, from the live album, featuring a dazzling, moving, double-bass solo, played with great feeling by Whitford.

After the gig, Harrison tells me his main influences as a composer are as diverse as J.S. Bach, Rodgers and Hart, Chopin,

Fauré and Ravel as well as Billy Strayhorn, who cowrote with Duke Ellington. There are also echoes of Lennon and McCartney, and Joni Mitchell, whose influence colours much of Harrison's work, which it occasionally resembles. Whitford and Zirilli seem ideal choices to present this vision. It is as if three magicians have flown down to enchant us.

But whatever the secrets of his craft, the wizardly Harrison's star is rising. As well as recruiting highly sought-after drummer Chris Higginbottom for his next appearance in Brighton, he is flying off to play the following night of the tour in Luxembourg, where I see him continuing to cast a spell on an increasingly international audience. for some time to come.



# **Karen Sharp Quartet**

Chichester Jazz Club Friday 12th December

The Karen Sharp Quartet was the perfect choice for a Christmas party and they began with the mellow The End of a Beautiful Friendship and the Leonard Bernstein classic Some Other Time.

The highlight of the evening was a warm and beautiful bass solo by Dave Green on the Luiz Eça standard *The Dolphin* (a tune made famous by Stan Getz).

During the interval it was time for coffee and mince pies. Christmas tunes were also served up with a slow, beautiful rendition of *In the Wee Small Hours of the Morning*, and *The Christmas Song* (complete with Xmas headgear provided by Nikki Iles).

There was also a 'mini-set' of Bill Evans tunes: the complex blues Interplay (another tune made famous by Stan Getz) featuring another melodic solo by Dave Green and Showtype Tune, a little-heard Evans original that features on Karen Sharp's album Spirit.

Pianist Nikki Iles stood out, with responsive, energetic soloing, blending perfectly with Dave Green and the subtle drumming of Steve Brown.

This was my first time at Chichester Jazz Club and my first impression is that this is a well-organised club of dedicated jazz fans, putting on top quality gigs at a really nice, spacious venue with excellent lighting and acoustics and with excellent playing by some of the UK's finest musicians, this was a night to remember.

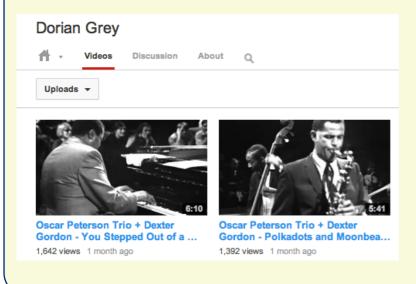




