






What's In A Name?

We've been quietly but firmly insisting in this column that there's something stirring in the world of jazz-and-related-musics, both here in the UK and further afield. While sales of recordings continue to plummet across all sectors, the rise of delivery via streaming services continues to increase; in fact, thanks to the massive uptake in streaming subscriptions, the global music sector is seeing growth for the first time in many years. In the UK, the rights collection society PRS has reported its highest ever annual pay-out of 527.6m GBP - this figure is not adjusted for inflation, but still represents an 11% growth over 2015, which means that it's the first time in 20 years that the seemingly inexorable decline in music revenues has been reversed. Given the option of streaming over piracy, most consumers seem to prefer streaming - this is in itself good news, but how much jazz musicians are benefitting from these developments is hard to assess. The sector is changing so fast that it's difficult to gather the stats



and analyse them in time to make a pronouncement without being almost instantly wrong-footed, but let's take a look at the US market, where the most widely trumpeted figures, from Nielsen's January 2015 report, suggest that jazz sales now only account for 1.4% of the total market, and, even worse, for only 0.3% of the streaming market. It seems that even if the good times may be tentatively returning, jazz has been banished from the party and made to sit forlornly in the corridor with its equally unpopular classmates, folk and classical, while the cool kids pop, rock and R&B take over the common room once and for all. But the picture is such a confusing one, with vinyl sales still showing growth decades after the format was supposed to have died forever; independent record stores thriving while major high street chains close, and the malignant spectre of YouTube hovering in the background with it's limitless free streams, teeth-grindingly annoying advertising and utterly opaque royalty structure, that it can support any number of conflicting opinions on the actual state of the music biz today, let alone prognoses for its future.

Anecdotal evidence from those musicians toiling tirelessly away at the coalface of the UK scene suggests that the loss of physical sales to streaming has often not been compensated by additional revenue from that source. One of our most ubiquitous and popular gigging jazz musicians has told me that his latest album - a widely reviewed, flawlessly swinging take on the hard bop tradition - sold around 500 copies, supported by a tour that packed in as many dates as it's possible to book in the UK. That's a turnover of 5000 GBP - a respectable addition to gig fees rather than a bonanza, but still far more than could be achieved through 500, 5000 or even 50,000 streams of the same album - in the kind of hand-to-mouth cottage industry of the self-released jazz album, every physical sale counts, so every sale lost to streaming is a blow to the sustainability of the model. Streaming payment models are weighted against niche artists, because the 'slice-of-the-pie' distribution method means that the majority of your subscription fees end up going to the big players, irrespective of whether you are listening exclusively to Dizzy Gillespie rather than Dizzee Rascal.

Of course, it's horribly dreary talking about music in terms of sales projections, delivery methods and market shares, and many, especially those not actually trying to make a livelihood from it, may feel that to focus on these drably prosaic matters is to miss the point completely. Move away from sales talk and back into the world of spontaneous creativity and live performance, where jazz has always thrived, and a different and far more encouraging picture emerges. This year, the renowned industry beanfeast now known as SXSW Festival hosted its first ever UK jazz showcase, as the triple alliance of promoters Jazz Re:Freshed, arts support unit British Underground and online magazine Jazz Standard brought an eclectic mix of UK artists to Austin, Texas to capitalise on the unmistakeable stirrings of interest in the UK scene (London duo Yussef Kamaal were refused visas at the last minute - now why might that have been?). Those of you who've been keeping an ear open to the sounds emanating from the New Generation Jazz nights at The Verdict will recognise many of the names being talked about -Moses Boyd, Femi Koleoso's Ezra Collective, Nubya Garcia, Nerija, Camilla George and Cassie Kinoshi are all past or future bookings whose names have been loosely linked together into something

approaching that most treasured of journalistic creations - a Movement. Jazz Re:Freshed, who have also hosted Brighton power trios Vels Trio and Howes3, have been doing sterling work in supporting a fresher young sound through their regular London shows, and this hard work is starting to attract attention internationally, as lauded American radio network National Public Radio recently broadcast a documentary about the new wave of British jazz musicians who played in Texas this year.

Some, however, may still approach this news with some circumspection. One thing that unites all the musicians mentioned above is their ambivalence about accepting 'jazz' as a defining label. All of them come from a jazz background but incorporate a great deal of genre fluidity, claiming inspiration from the rich melting pot of contemporary UK urban music as much as the international jazz tradition. In theory, this is the sound of young musicians incorporating the musical influences of their own age group in order to move the tradition forward and reclaim its relevance to the millennial generation. In practice this means a great deal of heavy ostinato groove stuff with spacey modal soloing - the focus is more on exploring the rhythmical energy borrowed from urban styles than on harmonic or melodic adventures.

The difficult task of re-engaging the wider, younger audience with jazz has long been discussed and bemoaned - there's definite signs of an emerging resolution, but the music itself is undergoing changes towards a different interpretation that has its own UK identity, and that some may feel excludes whole chunks of the current scene, which may be no less worthy but have less appeal beyond the traditional constituencies. Anyone interested in this work in progress, and fortunate enough to have obtained tickets for this years Love Supreme Festival, which in a sign of the changes discussed here has sold out for the first time in its 5 year history, can check out what's happening by seeking out any of the several bands on the bill to feature prolific multi-reedsman Shabaka Hutchings. He's also a man whose interviews have revealed a number of very interesting perspectives on the shape of jazz to come - but they and the full attention they merit, will have to wait for the extra space waiting in our next issue.

Charenee Wade

Who have been your biggest influences as a vocalist?

My biggest influences growing up definitely included Betty Carter, Dianne Reeves, Sarah Vaughan, Cassandra Wilson, Carmen McRae.

Where did the idea come from to do an album of Gil Scott-Heron's music?

The idea came from Mark Ruffin. He had produced a Gil Scott-Heron record before, but this was his first time with a woman's voice. With my vocal and arranging approach, we both realized that this project would be unique and interesting.

Tell us about the band that you'll be bringing to England.

The band consists of Oscar Perez on piano, Paul Beaudry on bass and Darrell Green on drums. I have been blessed to work with these talented musicians over the years in different configurations. Together as a unit we are 'East Coast meets West Coast', a powerful collaboration.

What advice can you give to other vocalists, based on your own experiences of learning jazz.

Keep learning as much as you can. There is always something to work on and ways that you can improve.


What plans do you have for the future?

Camilla George

How did you first get into music?

"I was really interested in saxophone from quite a young age and I won a music competition when I was eleven and I got saxophone lessons and a saxophone. From then on I discovered Tomorrow's Warriors, and particularly Gary Crosby. They really were the force behind getting into the music business and becoming a professional player. So I started doing Jazz Jamaica and then Gary was the one that suggested that I audition for Trinity. So I went to Trinity and did the jazz course, the Masters. After that, I guess I was in the real world! I had to forge my own way, and that's when I created my quartet."

Your debut album, *Isang*, has been critically acclaimed. Were you surprised by that?

"Yes, I definitely was surprised by that. You just never really know, especially when it's a first album. I thought, for me, it had taken a long time to get there. There are a lot of players now who are really quite young and are bringing out their first albums in their twenties etc., so I think it was a long time coming and I guess that's why it was more of a surprise because I really didn't know what people would make of it."



This might seem an odd question, but what scares you the most about the jazz world?

"That's an interesting one. That's really hard to answer because at the moment I'm not scared because there's like a revival at the moment, particularly with the young SJM July 2017 11 players. But I guess maybe it would be sustaining the level of playing. There are times when I just haven't played as much and you can get quite down."

In terms of everything that you've learnt along the way, what advice would you give to musicians just starting out?

"Obviously have fun, because it can be very hard work. Going out to jam sessions and meeting people is a good way to go about things. For me, that's how I met my band, through a combination of that and college. I think it's really important to get connections and to make connections on the scene, so that when you do get your stuff together and you're bringing out your own project, people know who you are. At least you have a good starting point."

Tell us a bit about your band. You've been playing together for a while?

"Yes, we've been playing together for three years. Sarah Tandy, the piano player, is amazing. I met her at Ronnie Scott's and I remember seeing her play and I just thought 'she is sooo good'. She went to the Academy, has her own trio and she performs all over London. She does the Servant Jazz Quarters every other Friday night and that's a great night."

"Dan Casimir, he's my bass player. I can't quite remember where or when I met him because it feels like we've known each other forever. I think it's through Tomorrow's Warriors. He has just released his EP [*Escapee*] on Jazz Re:freshed and that's doing really well. It's a great EP. He does Jean Toussaint's Art Blakey project [Roots & Herbs], he plays in the Clark Tracey Quintet and does all manner of things. He's amazing."

"Femi Koleoso is my drummer. He's the youngest person in the band, he's 21 or maybe 22. He's an amazing player and he's a member of Ezra Collective and they're doing great things on the London scene. They released their EP and it was completely sold out. He's in Jean Toussaint's band as well, and loads of other projects. He's a great young player."


What's next for you and your band. Are you planning another album?


"Definitely. At the moment I'm trying to finish writing stuff but it's based on a book called *The People Could Fly*, which my mum used to read to me, and it's basically American folklore, tales using animal imagery. It's based around slavery but it's tales about rabbits and other animals. It's quite an interesting book. The main aspect of it is freedom so I've been writing these pieces which I hope interlock to create a new album."






Love Supreme Guide

Big Band Scene

Patrick Billingham reviews recent big band gigs at The Brunswick, The Round Georges and B.O.A.T..

That's another election out of the way. My thanks to all who responded to my plea to register to vote and then to use it. Now back to the real world where the big band Summer season is starting to take off.

The **Big Band@ Brunswick** slot for June was occupied by the Studio 9 Orchestra. Their repertoire, including music from Radiohead, Ken Wheeler and Maria Schneider was, as ever, immaculately performed and was enjoyed by a slightly less than capacity audience.

Earlier that weekend, a new venue for the Brighton Big Band was the Round Georges pub in Kemp Town. The audience, many of whom had not previously experienced a live big band, were very appreciative of the music ranging from Glenn Miller, through Basie and Nestico to unarguably jazz charts with many opportunities for soloing. In this area, two octogenarians in the front line showed that age is no impediment to energetic and inventive improvisation. A return here is likely in the Autumn. Meanwhile, the band is this month's **Big Band@Brunswick** offering.

In the middle of the month, the Sussex Jazz Orchestra returned to The Roebuck Inn at Laughton, near Lewes. Much of the programme consisted of numbers written or arranged by members of the band. At the start, the audience was in single figures. But the energy and enthusiasm of the performance soon attracted people from the other bars.

Terry Pack's Trees were back at the Ropetackle Arts Centre in Shoreham towards the end of the month to launch their CD. Which, as I found out, by buying an advance copy, comes with a DVD containing a bonus track. This time there were, by my count, 35 musicians on stage. And as mentioned in my review in March (SJM 62), the overall sound texture of this phenomenal band has been improved by increased



amplification of the voices.

A couple of days later, Trees played the first set at the third annual 'Sunday in the Park with Jazz' at B.O.A.T., the Brighton Open Air Theatre. There were some changes in personnel, and only 29 musicians on stage, but still sounding great. They were followed by The One World Orchestra, with a more conventional big band lineup, playing Paul Busby charts, including a selection from his Brighton suite. My Venn diagram shows me that nine musicians had sufficient stamina to play in both bands. Despite the blustery wind, the acoustics were excellent, allowing the audience to enjoy the full sonic texture of these two contrasting bands. Both, incidentally, playing music consisting entirely of compositions by residents of this county. Congratulations and grateful thanks to Charlotte Glasson for continuing to organise this inspiring and enjoyable afternoon's entertainment.

Finally, at the risk of offending brass and rhythm sections, and outraging readers of the Daily Mail, I can't resist passing on this quote from Zoe Williams in The Guardian, Monday 19th June. '... something bigger than triumph, the powerful moment that we all understand but only athletes, warriors and saxophonists have experienced'.

Oscar Peterson

My Favorite Instrument

Like several of my musician friends, I started out feeling rather uneasy about Oscar. I heard some very impressive work on record, especially a concert version of "Tenderly", but, in person, I was not so sure. Several times in the late 1950s I heard the trio with Herb Ellis on guitar and really did not enjoy it. There were too many breakneck tempos, an intense drive which seemed to lack real swing - every number seemed very tight. Then came the trio with Ed Thigpen on drums. This was much more relaxed, - and better suited for work with guest musicians. My began admiration for Oscar to develop. Then, about 1972, I heard him play a solo set at a London Concert. It was superb; I loved his mastery of solo jazz piano. This CD will recapture for you the exciting, sensitive



performance which I heard that evening. My favourite track is Oscar's beautifully restrained reading of Anthony Newley's "Who Can I Turn To"

Live Reviews

Geoff Simkins Trio

The Verdict, Brighton Sunday 18th June 2017

Local legend Geoff Simkins hasn't released an album under his own name for a number of years, so it was great to see him launch his new album at The Verdict in Brighton, accompanied by the two other musicians on the CD, Nikki Iles and Dave Green.

With some beautiful and sensitive playing from Nikki Iles on the introduction to Julie Styne's *Make Someone Happy* and a playful and soulful solo on *Elsa*.

Simkins, often providing extra backing to some inspired and delicate soloing by bassist Dave Green.

Ending the set was a jointcomposition entitled *For DJC*, dedicated to guitarist Dave Cliff, which began with a Herbie-inspired piano introduction that merged into a beautiful ballad reminiscent of Sam Rivers.

The second set began with one of Bill Evans' most challenging c o m p o s i t i o n s, *Interplay*, highlighting Simkins' ability to play complex tunes but add genuine warmth to them.

The complexity continued with the composition *Mooch Too Early*, Josh Rutner's Respect Sextet's hybrid of Bird's *Moose* the Mooche over the chords of Bill Evans' Very Early.

By way of contrast, they then performed Nelson Cavaquinho's Beija Flor as a gentle bossa nova.

With Lee Konitz's Subconscious-Lee, Geoff excelled at what he does so well: fast and fluid bebop lines across the entire range of the instrument with rhythmic punctuations.

Always one for finding hidden gems, Geoff's choice of the Earl Zindars' waltz Sareen Jurer, made famous by Bill Evans, was the climax of the second set and once again featured a beautiful solo by Dave Green, followed by an encore of How Deep Is The Ocean.

The album, *In a Quiet Way*, is out now on the Symbol label.

Geoffrey Keezer & Gillian Margot The Verdict, Brighton

The Verdict, Brighton Monday 5th June 2017

Beginning with a masterclass, in association with Brighton Jazz School (of which Keezer is a patron), husband and wife team GeoffreyKeezer and Gillian Margot answered questions from the audience that covered everything from musical empathy, rubato, introductions, rhythm, song choice and solo improvisations.

Between them they have decades of experience in music, Keezer being a former Jazz Messenger in his youth before launching a solo career and more recently performing in Storms/ Nocturne with Joe Locke and Tim Garland. Likewise, Gillian Margot is a classically-trained vocalist capable of singing in a myriad of different styles.

With that in mind, the gig later in the evening was something to look forward to. Beginning with solo piano, Keezer illustrated how to take a simple pop song and make it your own, using David Bowie's *Lifeon Mars* as a vehicle for extended techniques and reharmonisations.

After being joined by Gillian Margot, Keezer launched into a co-composed original, followed by the title of Keezer's forthcoming album On My Way To You.

Margot's rich low register was well-suited to the choice of repertoire, especially on a swinging *I Didn't Know What Time It Was* which incorporated stride piano, Art Tatum-style virtuosity and Keezer's trademark grooving lefthand to accompany Margot's fluent scat soloing.

This was followed by their interpretation of Simply Red's *Holding Back The Years*, from Margot's most recent album.

Performing a single set of around one hour and twenty minutes, they ended with the ballad *The First Time (Ever I Saw Your Face)* made famous by one of Margot's role models, Roberta Flack.

Overall, whilst Gillian Margot is highly proficient and a very gifted singer, her style tends to lean towards the more soulful, in contrast with the jaw-dropping virtuosity of straight-ahead jazz pianist Keezer.


